Historical Society Honors College with Preservation Award

The Cherokee County Historical Society, as part of its efforts to encourage the preservation of historical sites in the community, recognized Chattahoochee Technical College for its initiatives to preserve the Woodstock Campus, which was built in the 1930s and is the former site of Woodstock Elementary School.

The campus underwent an extensive \$5.3 million renovation in 2013 and reopened for the Fall Semester in 2015.

The gymnasium underwent a massive overhaul in 2016 and is now used as the

college's Student Center. It also serves as Fresh Start Cherokee's The Circuit, which was created to foster entrepreneurship and business development in Cherokee County.

Overall, improvements to the 46,011-square-foot building included a new roof, windows, HVAC system, electrical system and plumbing to preserve the historical structure and maintain functionality in the 80-year-old-plus facility.

The college has been able to utilize a majority of the existing facilities on the campus.

Furnace Donation Provides Students with Hands-on Learning Experience

Move On When Ready students enrolled in Chattahoochee Technical College's Air Conditioning Technology program at the Bartow County College and Career Academy (BCCA) will now have even more opportunities to work on air conditioning and heating equipment thanks to a generous donation from a community partner.

Georgia Propane Gas Association donated a Lennox High-Efficiency Propane Furnace to the program in an effort to support training efforts on propane gas appliances. The furnace, which has an estimated value of \$1,000, will be used in a dynamic, hands-on learning environment, where students are taught

how to install, maintain and repair heating, cooling, ventilation and refrigeration systems.

Air Conditioning Technology is currently offered at the college's Marietta and Canton campuses as well as the BCCCA, which allows high school students in Bartow County the ability to participate in technical college-level education.

"The Move On When Ready students participating in the Air Conditioning Technology program will greatly benefit from this donation, as it will further assist the instructors as we teach basic principles and fundamentals," said CTC instructor Joe Esposito. "With this type of hands-on
